Byron Sands explains how digital cameras work

The October 11 meeting of the Grand Canyon Photography Club will feature Byron Sands, portrait photographer and former research executive with Hewlett-Packard. Byron's presentation at 7 pm at the Gmeiner Art and Cultural Center in Wellsboro will focus on how a digital camera works and how to apply that knowledge to capturing the images you desire.




An expert on the technical aspects of photographic equipment, Byron will attempt to tailor his presentation to topics of interest to club members and to explain concepts in ways that people without a technical background will be able to grasp. As time allows, topics may include digital camera basics, how digital sensors work, what "field of view crop" means and why that matters. We may discuss color spaces, white balance and color temperature and how they apply to images as well as digital image formats and what we need to know about them to preserve our images.

Byron was born in Arkansas and grew up in Africa and Europe, and he currently lives in New Milford, PA. He graduated from the University of Arizona and received graduate training at the Albuquerque



Technical Institute, University of New Mexico, and Harvard University. Byron spent over 3 decades in technology and digital imaging, working in research and development for the world's largest technology companies: Hewlett-Packard, Compaq and IBM. He led engineering teams in the early 80's that pioneered digital high speed inkjet scanner/duplicators, in the late 80's that pioneered laser printers, in the early 90's that pioneered low power, high speed modems and cell phone connectivity in laptop computers, and in the latter 90's that brought digital multimedia into the personal computer. Byron holds patents in the area of digital communications. He retired from Hewlett-Packard as a Distinguished Technologist in 2008.

It's Twilight Time



Back in 1958 the Platters sang, "Heavenly shades of night are falling, it's twilight time". Were they ever right! Once the sun has set don't pack up your gear and head home. With a tripod and long exposures, you can get images with spectacular color. Sometimes the color is reflected off of high clouds or it can just be wonderful colors in the clear sky. This is also true of the morning prior to sunrise. The times of about 30 minutes before sunrise and 30 minutes after sunset are called civil twilights.

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Often, the color is much better at twilight than it is at actual sunrise or set. Colors can range from purple to gold and even rainbow colors. Images taken of water work really nicely since you get reflections of the color too.

You will need a tripod to take good photographs at these twilight times since your exposures may be several seconds to minutes long. Don't push the ISO too high, 400 or less is best, since you will get grainy shots.



Ann-ecdotes

Ann Kamzelski presents techniques and creative ideas for getting great photos.

You will also want to have an object such as a tree or building in the shot to add interest. This object will show up as a silhouette because you should take your exposure reading on the sky just above the horizon.

There are several websites that will give you the civil twilight times for the area that you are in. One of the easiest to use is <http://www.sunrisesunset.com/USA/>. You simply pick the state, then the city, followed by the month that you are interested in. You have lots of options for what is shown. I usually select civil twilight, moon phases and moon rise/set times. The data for the entire month will be generated. You can also choose Canada or another country. If I am going on a trip, I will print out the information for the area where I am going and take it along.




Another interesting website is photoephemeris.com. This is a free downloadable program that will not only give you the time of sunrise/set, civil twilight and moon rise/set, but will also show you exactly at what direction these events will happen on a specific day. This can be very useful information if you have a precise location that you want to photograph, such as a lighthouse.




