Using Filters

The November 11th meeting of the Grand Canyon Photography Club will feature a program on using filters by member John Newell. The program will begin at 7 p.m. at the Gmeiner Art & Cultural Center in Wellsboro, PA after a short business meeting.

The presentation on filters will cover the two filters that are the most useful in digital photography. These are

the two that can't be replaced with post processing. John will also talk about how to select the right sizes and quality for your lenses, how to avoid disaster in mounting filters, how to use filters for some "off label" effects, and some Yankee ingenuity techniques.

John has been interested in photography for many years and began as a portrait photographer. Having worked predominantly with film, he presently is working on transitioning to digital.

The Grand Canyon Photography Club was established in 2001 by Art & Christine Heiny. The first meeting was held in January of that year and meetings are still held the second Tuesday of every month at the Gmeiner Art & Cultural Center in Wellsboro, PA. Meetings typically run from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Annual dues are \$20/year per individual, \$35 per family. Individuals may attend two meetings before they are asked to join.

Each month a program is given on some aspect of photography. Some past program topics: Smart Phone Photography, Architechtural Photography, Composition, Lighting, Photography Ethics, Black and White, Portraiture, Post Processing and more. Programs are often presented by knowledgeable club members. Special presenters have included Wayne Palmer, Curt Weinhold, Ed Heaton, Tony Sweet, Art Becker, John Levandoski, and Jamie Konarski Davidson, to name a few. After a refreshment break, member images on a pre-determined topic are critiqued.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I was encouraged to see a first-time critique image from one of our members last month. While our critiques are positive and meant to help our members improve their skills, it can still be daunting to put an image out there for others to comment on. As someone who has been the critic a few times, it isn't always easy being the person making the comments either.

In the club's early years, members brought in physical photos between 5x7 and 11x14 inches, and the evening's presenter was asked to critique them. As you can imagine, it was often hard to see the image for those sitting anywhere but the first two rows! After a few years the club purchased a digital projector and critique images were emailed in as they are now. A few years later a newer projector was purchased. Once we went digital, we stopped asking presenters to be the critic and had designated club members take over the role.

Even when I'm not the person standing up in front of the room, I often struggle with what to say about an image while I sit in the audience. I've given it some thought, and I think the two most important things to keep in mind when asked to comment on a photo are: be encouraging, and be specific. Starting out with positives sets the right tone. When you focus on the strengths of an image, it often makes the creator of the photo more receptive to the offered suggestions.

As for being specific, a phrase like "nice shot" is well-meant, but someing like "the colors really pop" is more helpful.

There are a number of specific aspects of a photo to comment on.

- 1. Composition: leading lines, use of space, balance, framing
- 2. Lighting: quality, directions, use of shadow
- 3. Color: warm or cool, harmonious or constrasty
- 4. Depth of Field: sharpness, selective blur, bokeh
- 5. Story/Mood: emotions-calming or dramatic
- 6. Cropping: tighter, vertical or horizontal

I'm going to try to be a better commentor. The critique is an important aspect of our club meetings as we all learn from each other.

Learn, practice, and have fun! And comment! Mia

The Power of What's Not There

In photography, we spend a lot of time thinking about what to include — the subject, the light, the story we want to tell. But just as important is what we choose to leave out. That's where negative space comes in.

Negative space is the area around your main subject — the quiet zones, the open sky, the sweep of water or wall that balances the scene. At first glance, it might seem empty, but that space is doing powerful work. It

gives your subject room to breathe. It creates mood.

It lets the viewer rest their eyes before returning to the point of focus.

Think of it as silence in music — essential for rhythm, emotion, and contrast. Without it, everything would feel crowded and loud.

When you're composing, try this simple exercise: once you frame your shot, look at everything except your subject. What's happening in the space around it? Does that

space enhance or distract? Could a shift in angle or a step backward change the balance?

Negative space is stunning in minimalist scenes — a single tree against snow,

a bird in flight across an empty sky, a lone figure at the edge of fog. But even in complex landscapes, a sense of openness can draw the viewer in.

As you photograph this month, experiment with space. Leave room for calm. Let simplicity do the talking. Often, the power of an image lies not in how much you show — but in how much you don't.
